

Video Transcript: Getting to Full Text: Bibliographic Citations

You have a reading list of citations, and you want to find the full text of the articles so that you can read them. Let's say you want this article from *History of Science*, volume 18, from 1980. Here's how:

There are up to three steps to finding full text of a journal article. Start with the Journals & Newspapers tab.

We can search for versions of this journal by using the **Journals and Newspapers** tab. We type in the title, and since both the words, 'History' and 'Science' are commonly found in journal titles, we specify that we want to find this exact title. In this case, the journal is available in both print and online versions.

The print ones are labeled **UNB Libraries Print Collection**. Note that the year we want, 1980, is not available in the range of years held in print, but that it is covered by our online access through Periodicals Archive Online.

We click on that link to open that access point. That opens Periodicals Archive Online, and the journal record for *History of Science*. If we explore the issues for Volume 18, we soon find our article in issue number 3. Click on the link to open the .pdf, and start reading!

If searching in the Journals and Newspapers tab does not find your journal, look the journal title up in **UNB WorldCat**.

Let's say you want to find this article, in the *Journal of Military History*. We will use UNB WorldCat, our catalogue to track down the full text. We type in the title, and click on GO. We see two entries for this journal.

If we click on the first title, we can see that we have this journal in both print and online holdings. By clicking on **view item details**, we get a list of the print holdings and their location in HIL-STACKS, and the online holdings have the location 'internet'.

Pay attention to the date ranges for each. We have pretty complete back files for this journal online, but the most recent issues of this journal are only available in print. You will need to jot down the call number and location and head to the library shelves to get your article.

If your searches in Journals and Newspapers and Quest do not lead you to the journal you are looking for, you need to use Document Delivery to request a copy from another library. See the Document Delivery screen-cast for directions on doing that.
